The Charles Bluemlein Script Collection is an intriguing reminder of the heady days of hand lettering and calligraphy in the United States. From the early 1930s through World War II, there were about 200 professional hand letterers working in New York City alone.





This occupation began its demise with the advent of photo lettering. After digital typography, it became virtually extinct. The odd way in which these scripts were created - by collecting different signatures and then completing the alphabets - is a fascinating adventure.





Because the set of constructed designs looked nothing like the original signatures, fictitious names were assigned to the new script typefaces. The typeface styles were then showcased in Higgins Ink catalogs.
